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November 8th General Election- Absentee Voting, Michiganders can apply to vote absentee in the Nov. 8 general election now. Clerks will begin mailing out absent voter ballots by Sept. 29. They will be available for early, in-person voting in clerks' offices on that date as well.

Blight, Weeds, or Junk Vehicles Properties must be kept in good repair, including exterior siding and roofs, and free of junk/debris. Additionally, city code states that vehicles must be registered and operable.

Grass and vegetation be maintained so as not to exceed 10 inches in height. A code enforcement inspector will take action on properties that are not maintained. They may also have weeds/grass cut at the property owner's expense. Please keep shrubs and trees trimmed back at corners to prevent traffic hazards, and away from sidewalks for pedestrian safety. Do not put lawn clippings or leaves in the road, alley, or gutters since they may clog storm drains, which can be costly to clear out.

<u>Please note: curbside collection of yard waste takes place in the spring and fall</u>. At all other times, yard waste must be taken to the DPW yard for disposal. Residents can drop off compostable materials Monday thru Friday from 8am to 4pm and Saturday from 8am to 11:30am.

ARPA Funds Survey Results The City has approximately \$877,000 available for funding projects from federal American Rescue Plan Act funds. Property Maintenance Code. The City Council recently adopted proposed amendments to the property maintenance code. The property maintenance code regulates the standards for maintaining residential and commercial properties. The last updated code edition was from 2006. City Council adopted the 2021 edition to ensure standards are up-to-date and follow current best practices. All properties including commercial, industrial, and residential are expected to follow these basic property maintenance standards. These are the standards used by the Code Enforcement and Rental Inspectors for compliance with health, safety, and welfare concerns.

Medical Marijuana Caregivers. The City Council recently adopted new regulations for medical marijuana caregivers producing marijuana for patients in Charlotte. Medical marijuana caregivers are allowed to grow marijuana for other patients by-right under Michigan law. However, recent state supreme court rulings have affirmed that local regulations on the activity are allowed, as long as they do not conflict with state-level laws and rules. The City Council approved the new rules in an effort to ensure that the production of medical marijuana at houses and homes in Charlotte does not become a nuisance in the neighborhoods where these grow operations are located. Similar to other home occupations, these standards limit how much of a residential home can be dedicated to this use, ensure safeguards are inplace to minimize offsite effects such as odors and noise, and provide a mechanism for permitting and review. Medical Marijuana Caregivers will be given time to register with the City once the regulations take effect.

Home Occupations. The City of Charlotte Planning Commission and City Council recently updated local rules regarding home occupations. The purpose of the update is to provide greater economic opportunity for Charlotte residents, while ensuring that home occupations do not disrupt residential neighborhoods. The term home occupation primarily means a small business based at a residence.

Previous regulations had not been updated in many years, and did not reflect the diversity of economic opportunity presented by the modern economy. Previous regulations were based on a short and outdated list of allowed home occupations, and a short list of prohibited occupations. Anything else was prohibited unless special permission was granted by the Planning Commission in the form of a Conditional Use.

After reviewing a range of newer ordinances adopted by other communities, the Planning Commission determined that a better approach is one relying on a set of standards for home occupations that protect neighbors and neighborhoods from any potential negative effects and nuisances that might result from a nearby home occupation. The new approach presumes that all legal economic activity that can be conducted from an individual residence is permitted, as long as it does not create off-site problems such as increased traffic and parking, noise, dust, smoke, vibration or unsightliness.

The City Council reviewed the work of the Planning Commission and adopted the new ordinance as recommended. Michiganders in crisis now have an easy-to-remember three-digit number to call for help – 988. Michigan has joined the nation in <u>transitioning to the 988-dialing code</u>, which will operate through the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline's network of more than 200 locally operated and funded crisis centers across the country.

In 2020, Congress designated the new 988 dialing code to operate through the <u>National Suicide Prevention Lifeline</u> This action expands the existing Lifeline beyond people who are feeling sui-

cidal to all individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis, including suicidal thoughts or substance abuse issues. Trained counselors will be available 24/7 to field calls. They will listen to the caller's problems, assess their needs and provide support by connecting them with resources, and alert local emergency crisis teams, if necessary.

Anyone with these concerns can call:

- Mental health-related distress.
- · Thoughts of suicide.
- Substance use crisis.
- Emotional distress.
- There are specialized services available for veterans, LGBTQ individuals and other groups.
- People who are worried about a loved one who may need support also can call.

The 988-dialing code does not replace the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (800-273-TALK (8255)) or other locally operated crisis lines. Instead, it serves as a universal entry point to connect individuals in need to trained crisis counselors who can help. MDHHS is working to ensure a solid infrastructure is built through coordination with 911 and other crisis service providers as the 988-dialing code launches.

Prior to the development of 988, the Michigan Crisis and Access Line (MiCAL) was funded by the Michigan Legislature in December 2018. MDHHS was charged with the development of MiCAL, which is currently operating in Oakland County and the Upper Peninsula, and with 988 implementation.

MiCAL is built on the SAMHSA's National Guidelines for Behavioral Health Crisis Care which is also the foundation for 988. In Michigan, MiCAL is responsible for answering 988 calls in all areas of Michigan. In Macomb and Kent counties, Macomb County Community Mental Health and Network 180 will answer 988 calls with MiCAL providing back-up call coverage.


Lead Service Line Replacement. A survey of the city's water system is needed to comply with the amended Michigan Safe Drinking Water Act which was changed in 2018 to require all municipal drinking water providers to inventory their water lines by 2025.



Part of that work includes verifying the material of the water service inside the residence. Water service lines can be copper or plastic, but some may be galvanized steel, iron, or lead.

While Charlotte has begun work on the outside portion of the project, a concerted effort will be undertaken soon to verify service material inside a home. If you would like to schedule an appointment for a city employee to verify your service, please call 517-543-8858.

A \$350,700 grant to assist in the effort to identify lead service leads has been obtained from EGLE. This work is mandated by the state, and more information about lead service lines can be found here: Michigan.gov lead and copper rule.



Michigan Homeowner Assistance Fund (MIHAF). The Fund was established under section 3206 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (the ARP) to mitigate hardships associated with the coronavirus pandemic by providing funds to prevent homeowner mortgage delinquencies, defaults, foreclosure, loss of utilities or home energy services and displacements of homeowners experiencing financial hardship on or after January 21, 2020 or for those homeowners who experience a coronavirus pandemic financial hardship that began before January 21, 2020 but continued after that date. Emergency Home Repair Program. Eaton County administers an Emergency Repair Program. No interest, no payment loans to Eaton County residents who meet federal, state and County Housing Program guidelines may be provided. This program assists with emergency repairs that are causing a health and safety risk to the occupants and the structure of the home.

The program offers up to \$20,000 in no interest, no payment loan assistance to repair and improve program participant's home. A deferred mortgage is recorded against the property for the amount invested into the home. 




